To begin with, many competitors were enthralled by the prospect of holding a maiden event at the University Sports Centre, an indoor pool replete with features worthy of a world meet.



A casual saunter about the pool deck and one sees an impressive array of rooms catered for technical officials. The business of water sports, it seems, is a serious one. That consideration was also given to the technical officials should not escape the casual observer too; all throughout the event, the turn and lane judges had ample room prowling along the poolside without interfering into the VIP sofas, which accommodated our two guests-of-honour, Misters Lee Kok Choy and Seetow Cheng Fave.

The shrill cry of the chief official's whistle smote the inner walls of the indoor pool, giving cue of the event's start...the competitors mounted the anti-slip starting blocks...the start judge spoke clinically, devoid of emotion, readying the competitors...the impending blast of the Automatic Officiating Equipment thereafter...and the rapturous cheering willing each competitor to go faster, higher and stronger – that was the very pulse of the SWC.

All amid these, there were those who were shuttling about the pool—"runners" as they were informally called—ferrying information to and from the chief officials to the competitor stewards. Like a lean and mean machinery, everyone was a cog in a whole—a tight unit of volunteers who saw the whole greater that the sum of its parts.
